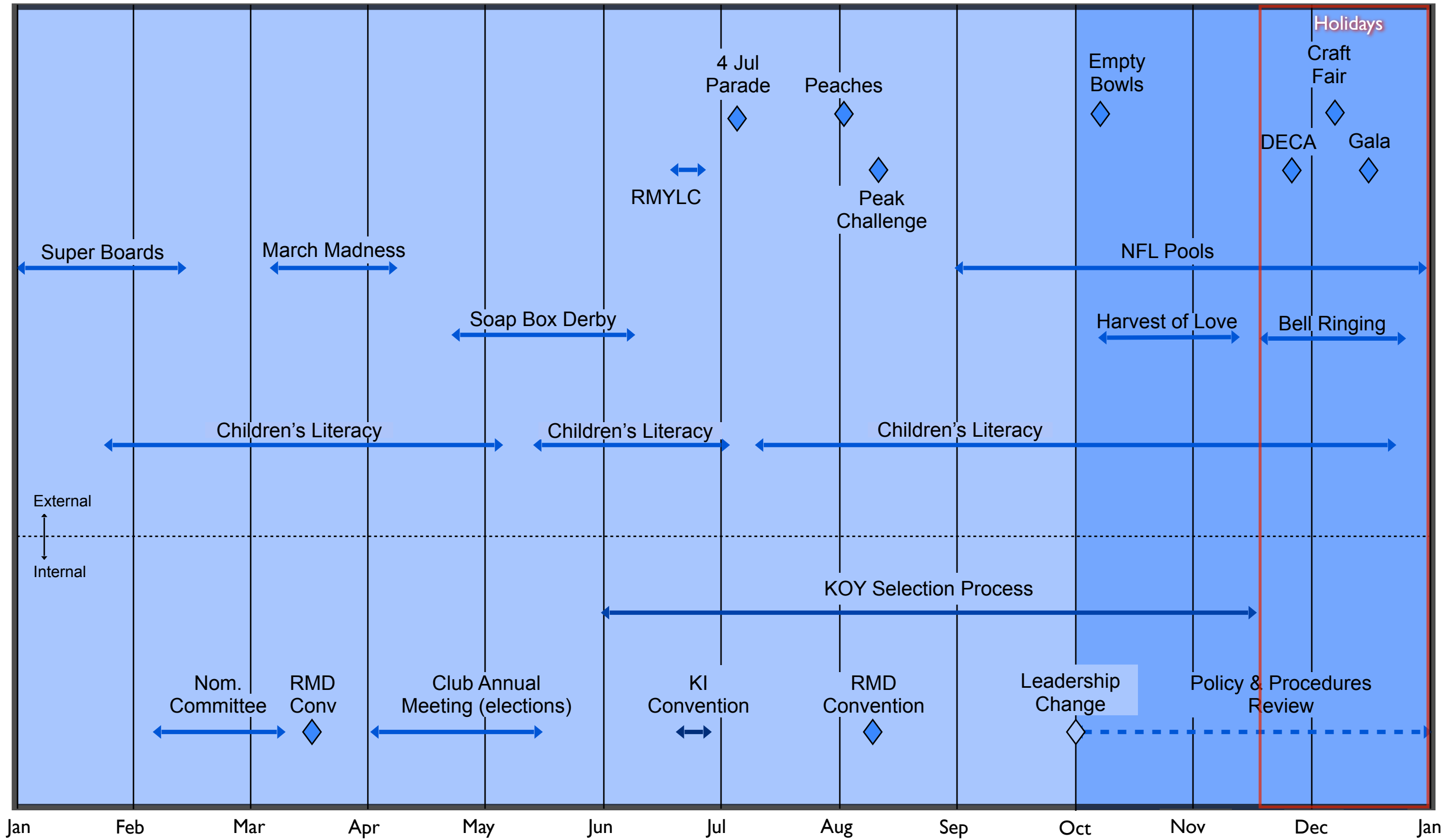
Service Leadership Program



- School Clubs Run by Students
 - Elementary School: K-Kids Clubs (6)
 - Middle School: Junior Key Club (1)
 - High School: Key Clubs (2)
 - College Circle-K Clubs: UCCS (1)
- Each Club has two advisors
 - School faculty advisor and MHKC advisor
 - Advisors do not run the clubs
- Students recruit members, elect officers, select charities select, plan and execute projects
- Student clubs perform fundraising and community service projects throughout the school year

Cost of Membership



- Dues
 - Joining Fee \$75
 - First quarter dues waived
 - Quarterly dues: \$60 for members (\$49.50 for life members)
 - Due 1st day of 1st month every quarter; payable within 15 days
- Additional Costs Are Optional

 - Member social events

- Originally chartered in 1974 as Monument Hill Sertoma, we have been supporting our Tri-Lakes community for over 48 years
- We changed affiliation to Kiwanis International on 1 July 2010, moving forward in our commitment to Youth with the Kiwanis Service Leadership Program (SLP) for school-aged youth

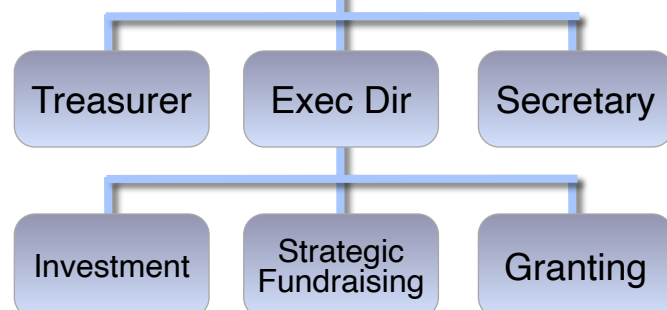
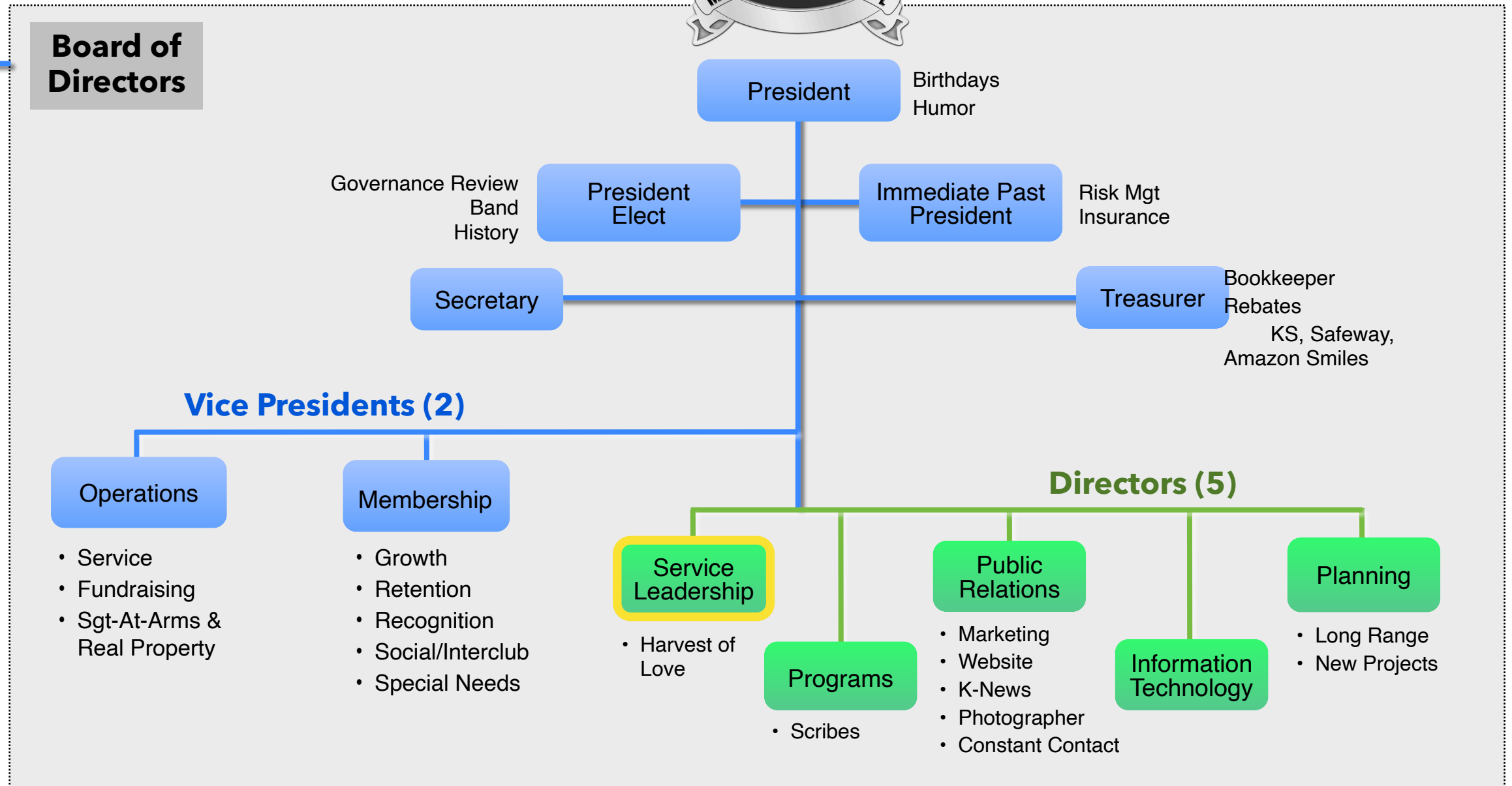
